Schoonover: A Legacy Spanning Three Generations

Schoonover Auto Repair was founded in 1938 by Charles A. ("Red") Schoonover, the father of the late Dick Schoonover. The enterprise initially commenced operations on University Avenue in St. Paul, subsequently relocating to 97 N. Snelling and later to 571 North Snelling Avenue.

In 1973, Dick Schoonover and his wife, Beryl, moved the business to Shoreview, establishing it at the southeast corner of Lexington Avenue and County Road E.



They also chose Shoreview as their residence, raising three sons who inherited their father's passion for sports, particularly hockey. The family continues to be actively involved in the local hockey community.

Throughout the years, Dick expanded the business while emphasizing the importance of high-quality service and customer satisfaction. In 2000, Dick's son Mike and his wife Gayle acquired the business and are proud to continue this third-generation family-owned enterprise, which has sustained its growth as an independent, full-service automotive repair facility.

In 2023, the fifty-year-old Shoreview location underwent substantial renovations and expansions.

The Shoreview Historical Society will honor the Schoonover family at a special program in April, with the exact date to be

confirmed.

Besides the April reception the family will be honored at the Slice of Shoreview by riding the trolley in the parade on July 26th. Additionally, their family name will be engraved on the Heritage Family plaque which will be displayed permanently at Shoreview City Hall.

Winter Wonderland




"My brothers Jerry and Donny Vincent and neighbor Mike McCann on Snail Lake. We had the largest ice rink on the lake." -Pat Sullivan

"Before the Twin Cities Arms Plant was fenced off, my dad and his older brothers (plus friends) used to go to the big hill for tobogganing. They had a 10 foot toboggan. He was sitting on the back end of the empty toboggan at the top of the hill while he tied his boot. Someone pushed him down the hill, him hanging off the back of it. Part way down, he rolled off. Toboggan kept on going. It crashed into a big rock at the bottom of the hill.

Many years later when he worked at the arsenal, he went out and found the rock and pieces of the toboggan still laying there.

IN MEMORIAM

Paul J. Christianson (July 10, 1932-November 9, 2024)

Paul, along with Joe Sacco, created the first shopping center in Shoreview in the mid 1960's (shown right).

Besides selling Rx and medical supplies, the Pharmacy had an extensive gift and cosmetic area. The pharmacy had a very large Hallmark department and baby items and small hardware items were sold. In the early days of the drug store, customers remember a nut machine and a tube tester that sold TV tubes!

In later years, a post office was added and there was also a Square Dance shop in the basement of the building.

Janice Quick Johnson (March 28, 1932 - October 28, 2024)

Preceded in death by husband Carl and survived by her four sons and their families. Janice's family, the Quicks, lived on the north side of Tanglewood. At one time, Jan and Carl lived with their family on the east side of Turtle Lake off Hodgson Road. The entrance to their driveway was flanked by the stone pillars that originally led to the Carlson estate on the corner of County Road I & Hodgson.
