## Schoonover: The SHS Heritage Family of the Year

In 1953, two young sophomores from Murray High School in St. Paul, Dick Schoonover and Beryl Spooner, crossed paths and ignited a love story that would span decades. With a playful spirit, Beryl quips, "It was a race to see who could get engaged first!" Just a few short years later, on June 9, 1956, this dynamic duo tied the knot at the Como Park Lutheran Church, embarking on a beautiful journey together.

Dick kicked off his career working for his father, Chuck, at Schoonover Auto Repair, while Beryl found her footing at

Montgomery Ward's Midway store. As their family began to grow with the births of their three boys - Jeff in 1958, Scott in 1959, and Mike in 1964 - they settled into a home on Larpenteur Ave. But it didn't take long for Beryl to realize that raising children alongside a bustling road was less than ideal. So, in



1964, they made a pivotal move to the charming "Hills of Homes" community in Shoreview, and with that, 3484 North Chatsworth Street became the backdrop of their joyful family life.

This idyllic neighborhood offered the perfect setting for their active family. The boys thrived at the nearby Island Lake school and became members of the Incarnation Lutheran Church community. With a backyard that transformed into a ballpark in summer and a hockey rink in winter, their home became a playground. The boys could often be found shooting hoops in the driveway or sneaking off for bike rides to Dick's Market, the "Y," or Cederholm Golf Course. Those carefree days included snowmobiling across the fields and walking to school, with great neighbors adding richness to their lives.

However, not all memories were carefree. The dreaded Fridley Tornado loomed large over their childhood, forever haunting them with sirens during storms. The day the TV tower fell, including the deaths of seven men working on the tower was another dark moment, and a close call with a grass fire that threatened their family shop in the mid-seventies nearly turned tragic. The fire was in between propane tanks at the rear of the business's property and the houses on Richmond court. Scott and Jeff helped Dick, and several employees move customer cars to safety and hose down the area to prevent the fire from getting too close to the tanks. Dick eventually passed out from stress and exhaustion.

In 1976, the Schoonovers made another life change, moving from Chatsworth Street to a wooded lot on a tranquil cul-de-sac, 337 Dawn Avenue. Their custom-built home was perfectly tailored for their growing family, where their boys attended Breck, Mounds View, and Chippewa schools, continuing to chase the game they loved - hockey!

Beryl poured her heart into making their house a home. With a flair for hospitality, she created a warm and inviting atmosphere, welcoming nearly everyone, establishing rich traditions around holidays and family dinners - even amidst the chaos that came with raising three hockey-playing boys and a husband who was busy managing a thriving family business.

Dick and Beryl embraced life together, enjoying adventures with friends, cherished Wednesday "date nights" at Kozlak's, and golfing at Midland Hills. They found solace in winter getaways to Palm Springs and Scottsdale, reveling in the sun and relaxation.

The family business, affectionately known as "The Shop," was a cornerstone of their lives. Established by Chuck Schoonover in 1938 with a borrowed \$50 from Harry Slawick, owner of Midway Ford, it became a local fixture on Snelling and Edmund in St. Paul (continued on page 4.)

Victory gardens were vegetable, herb and fruit gardens planted during World War I & World War II. They were also called war gardens or food gardens for defense.

People were encouraged to plant victory gardens for many reasons including helping to boost morale. They also supplemented rations and reduced pressure on the food supply.

Some of the food that was grown was atypical of many local gardens. Produce grown included kale, kohlrabi, lettuce, swiss chard, beans, beets, cabbage and carrots.



In the United States, around one third of the vegetables produced by the United States came from victory gardens, Eleanor Roosevelt planted a Victory Garden in 1943 on the White House lawn, "Food will win the war" proclaimed Herbert Hoover.

### 4-H During the War Years

In Ramsey County, membership in 4-H clubs remained high during WWII. In 1943, 4-H members tended 118 acres of Victory Gardens.

#### Flower for a Farmhouse

On a farm, things needed to be sustainable. Crops were grown to sell or to use for livestock food or for family use. However, there were also some typical flowers that brightened many a farmhouse.

Peonies and day lilies were found near most farmhouses. Irises were easy to grow and provided early color. Spirea bushes, also known as bridal veil, were popular but perhaps the most popular bush grown were lilacs. Lilacs were often planted near the family outhouse for obvious reasons!!

Other popular perennials were hollyhocks, foxgloves, delphiniums, and columbines. Hardy roses were also enjoyed.





The Shoreview Garden Club began with 22 members in 1991 and currently has 'grown' to 58 members.

Another popular perennial grown near many a farmhouse was the one called "pie plant."

Today you know it as rhubarb. It was first grown in China before making its way west to the United States.

Rhubarb, which looks like celery, is considered a vegetable but it is prepared like a fruit. Since it is quite tart, sweetener is added when it is made into pies, tarts, sauce and other desserts. Some cooks mix strawberries with rhubarb when making jam or a strawberry rhubarb pie.

Here is a popular recipe:

#### Rhubarb sauce

- 2 lbs. (about 4½ cups) rhubarb, cleaned and cut into small pieces
- 1 cup water
- 1½ cups sugar

Mix all ingredients in large saucepan and slowly heat, covered. Simmer until tender but not mushy (about 12-15 minutes).

You may add more sugar if necessary. To make a thicker sauce, mix 1 Tbsp cornstarch with a small bit of cold water. Stir well into the sauce as it finishes cooking.
